Candidate Qualities




Across the political spectrum, common qualities voters look for in leaders are 'problem-solver', 'responsible', and 'dependable'.



Please indicate which opinion you agree with more, even if neither is exactly right.




Republicans are more likely to vote for a candidate who represents their political views (67%), while Democrats are slightly more likely to vote for candidates with an excellent character (55%).



Other than Donald Trump, who should be the leader of the Republican party? Please select just one name.




SECTION 2

Rating Performance of Elected Officials



Three-in-five voters indicate that transparency in decision-making and integrity in personal/professional conduct are *very important* to registered voters when evaluating the performance of their representatives.

How important, if at all, are the following when you are evaluating the performance of your elected officials?



Democrats (64%) are much more likely than Republicans (52%) to indicate that the ability to collaborate with other elected officials is *very important* to them when evaluating the performance of their elected officials.


SECTION 3

Issue Trust & Divided Government




A plurality of voters trust Republicans to handle key issues for the 2024 election cycle, like immigration, the economy, and the Israel-Hamas war. A plurality of voters trust Democrats to over Republicans to deliver on government services.

Who do you trust more to handle each of the following issues?




A majority (52%) of voters do not prioritize electing officials from another party for political office in the hope of having a divided government.

As you may know, divided government is when one political party controls the executive branch and the other controls one or both houses of government. Some say that this helps maintain checks and balances for both parties. When you are voting for elected officials, would you vote for the other party for a political office in the hope that there is a divided government?



A plurality of voters across the political spectrum indicate that, no, they would not vote for the other political party in the hope for a divided government – Democrats are more likely than Republicans to express they would do this.
